1. Call to Order; Introductions

Chair Myhr opened the meeting at 1:31 and welcomed everyone; introductions were made.

7. Report from the Advisory Board

Arthur Jackson reported:

- The Advisory Board met on April 6th and had a pre-meeting presentation by Jim Cozad and Irene Morgan with Opportunity Council in Whatcom County.
- Minutes from March were approved as amended.
- The Board conducted site visits to Rainbow Center and Lake Whatcom Center on March 30th.
- The Board received follow-up report on the housing issue by a Program of Assertive Community Treatment consumer.

10. Report from the Planning Committee

Regina stated the Planning Committee has not met since the last meeting of this Board. Regina provided an overview of the funding transfers proposed by the Planning committee based on provider requests and made a motion (#10-019) to accept the funding reallocation as outlined below and recommended by the Planning Committee, seconded by Dave Gossett, brief discussion followed, Chair Myhr called for the vote, all in favor, motion carried (#10-019). Regina was thanked for her report.

Budget Transfer Requests from NSMHA Providers

These transfers have been requested by the Community Mental Health Center Providers to more accurately configure their programs and services to the demand for services over the last two years. The original allocation was set up by NSMHA when it contract for the new fee-for-service system in 2007. All budgets are subject to revision after the State Legislature and the Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery set their funding for the next fiscal year.

These requests were received in response to a NSMHA inquiry regarding whether the agencies want to adjust their budget allocations within their total funding caps.

11. Report from the Executive Director

Chuck Benjamin reported:

- Still awaiting the state budget to be finalized
- The DSHS reorganization takes effect May 1st.
 - o Health Care Cabinet under the Governor
 - Questioning the placement of Mental Health and Substance Abuse under the DSHS restructuring
 - O Ken Stark stated it will be important for this board to start gearing up for what all the transitions are about. Looking at folding alcohol/drug treatment dollars and mental health treatment dollars into the health care reform package so there will be single managed care contracts. Brief discussion ensued on mental health and substance abuse, state and federal funding, and what is going to be the role of the counties and RSN's. Ken said this is reminiscent of what happened in 1993 and feels this time it is more serious. Chuck added that he would like to see WSAC and RSNs have this discussion. Ken stated our roles are going to change dramatically.
 - Crisis System Review-Chuck said he wanted to thank all that participated; all five counties, consumers, advocates, providers, law enforcement, department of corrections, jail administrators, consultants and NSMHA staff.
- Preparing for DBHR audit, two weeks from now
- Economic times are hard; we see all the changes occurring at the state and federal level. He wanted to recognize that these are hard times, but we'll work together and weather the storm. Calm minds really

do need to prevail, just ask everybody to focus on our Vision of Hope and Paths to Recovery, noting that sometimes you need to take a couple of steps back in order to be able to move forward. Chuck was thanked for his report.

12. Report from the Finance Officer

Bill Whitlock reported:

- The financial statements for 2009 are almost done. We accrued the revenue and expenses for the year end. We are still working on the deferred revenue. The Federal Block Grant, and PATH (Project for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness) grant were a little low, \$39,800 and \$36,606 negative variance respectively. Interest revenue was lower than budgeted due to the low interest rates. The detox pilot ended in June and the state funds had two budget cuts in 2009. Overall, the revenues were a little higher in 2009 due to the increase in Medicaid eligible population. A few variances on the expense side in professional services, operating leases, insurance and utilities. The NSMHA operating expenses were under budget by \$348,638.
- The current year financial statements have some variances. The Federal Block Grant and PATH are a little low, \$24,675 and \$3,145, respectively. The state funds are low by \$268,352 and the Medicaid is high by \$1,359,279. The agency and inpatient budgets are also a little over on their budgets at this time.
- We are still waiting for the legislature to pass the state budget. This will set the state funding and allow actuaries to set our Medicaid rates so we can estimate out Medicaid funding. Bill was thanked for his report.

13. Report from the Finance Committee

Ken Stark reported:

- The committee met today, reviewed claims for the month of March, is recommending approval of motion 10-015, seconded by Dave Gossett, all in favor, motion carried.
- With the new transition at DBHR, up until this point, RSN contracts were managed by MaryAnne Lindelblad under the medical section and are now being managed through David Dickinson under Aging and Adult Services. This will be a learning curve for Mr. Dickinson as he is not familiar with RSN's. Bob Myhr suggested inviting him to a Board meeting. Chuck said he would invite him to the May meeting.

Ken was thanked for his report.

14. Consent Agenda – Finance Committee

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Motion #10-015

To approve NSMHA-McTAVISH-PSC-10 Amendment 1 for the provision of Leadership Development Consultation Services. The term of this Agreement is extended to June 30, 2010. The amount of this Amendment is \$13,400 for a total maximum on this Agreement of \$18,400.

Chuck provided an explanation for 10-017. Moved by Mr. Gossett, seconded by Mr. Dahlstedt, all in favor, (# 10-017) motion carried.

Motion #10-018

To approve NSMHA-UNIVERSITY of WASHINGTON-PSC-10 for the provision of a Wraparound Comparison Evaluation by Dr Eric Bruns for non-fidelity Children's Wraparound Services in the Region. The term of this Agreement is April 19, 2010 through December 31, 2010. The maximum consideration on this Agreement is \$76,000.

Chuck provided an explanation for motion 10-018 and said he is in discussions with Randy Hart at Children's Administration about sharing the costs of this study. It appears Children's Administration will share costs, it is just uncertain at this time how much funding we will receive.

Moved by Mr. Dean, seconded by Mr. Stark, all in favor, motion carried (#10-018).

Dave Gossett stated that Arthur mentioned a change in reimbursement rates being proposed by the Advisory Board. He asked that NSMHA get the reimbursement rates for all 5 counties when looking at the recommendations from the Advisory Board. Chuck agreed.

Ken Stark suggested that when inviting David Dickinson to also invite the Secretary as she is very interested in going out and meeting various groups, she attended a meeting at Snohomish County Human Services, toured the Bailey Center and the new Molina clinic.
